Speaking of cruises, have you signed up yet for Bob Miller's Updated Cruise Planning Course which begins March 30? This should be a fun as well as educational course, with lots of sea stories.

If you'd like a suggestion for armchair reading as spring approaches, read The Boys in the Boat by Daniel James Brown. Just about everyone in Whatcom County has read this book about how a rough and tumble crew of lads at UW, an amazing coxswain, a racing shell builder, and a team coach came together and won the 1936 Olympics right under Adolph Hitler's bent-out-of-shape nose. Even though we know the outcome, it is a real page turner! My heart (and a tear or two) went out to one of the crew members. It is worth your time.

Ferry trivia On another note, when Paul and I car ferried to Victoria over Christmas, I found some interesting facts in the newspaper about the BC ferries. There are three kinds of ferries from Tsawwassen to Swartz Bay. The old Queen of New Westminster, one of the oldest in the B.C. fleet, can go faster than the larger Sprit ferries thanks to new engines installed in the 1990s. It is not as fast as the three newest Coastal ferries. The Spirits have power at only one end, and it takes six minutes to turn around in good weather. In windy weather they may take 20 minutes to turn around. The Coastals have propellers at both ends and can head straight from one terminal to another.

If a medical emergency is life-threatening, the ferry will go to the nearest dock. People in pleasure boats often cause significant delays for the ferries because the boaters are less aware of what is expected of them on the water. (They need a USPS course!)

Marine rescues occur about 20 times a year. If ferry crew see another vessel in trouble, they respond. Ferries often serve as windbreaks to make rescues easier.

Food facts: Annually, the ferry system goes through 954,149 pounds of French fries, serves 187,887 bowls of clam chowder, 1,967,922 cups of coffee (unless George Johnson is on the ferry and the number increases by 20), and 1,185,776 burgers.

Scratch your head over these passengers: People drive on the ferry, then walk off at their destination, expecting to find their car on shore. Meanwhile, ferry personnel are searching for the driver of an abandoned vehicle on board, worrying that someone might have fallen overboard. Some people are surprised to find there is no valet service for their cars. Some people drain the vehicle's battery by watching videos or playing CDs with the engine off during the one hour 35 minute crossing. And then there are the loose children and pets...

Over-view of January's Rendezvous-Planning meeting was given by Kari in lieu of a Secretary's Report.

Treasurer's Report by Michael Connell: The balance on 1/31/15 was \$3,112.84.

Administrative Report by Deanna Randall-Secrest: The first-aid/CPR course is still being planned. Deanna wanted to know what dates simply did not work for those who hoped to attend. It is tentatively being set for March 28th. Tonight's program will be presented by Deputy Brad Holmes of the Skagit County Sheriff's Search and Rescue.

Events: Donna asked those who plan to attend the day trip to Langley, on February 14th, about a change in time. She also asked that those who were thinking of participating in the August cruise, get together for some planning. Lynn gave the bad news that the Oak Harbor RV park will be closed during our April rendezvous, and an alternate location will have to be decided upon by those with RVs.

Education Report by George Johnson: Due to lack of interest, the Engine Maintenance course has been cancelled. The dates were changed for the Cruise Planning course, and it will be held in May. There will be no ABC class until fall, as he Coast Guard has one coming up soon.

George asked for permission to pay the \$160 fee for a booth at Shipwreck Day. Motion was made by Dale Libby, seconded by Albert Miller. Motion passed. He asked that we collect new stuff, so that the booth will have fresh stock.

The USPS is seeking \$100,000 as a consultant's fee to receive better "branding" and is asking each squadron to give \$100. Motion was made, by Bob Miller, for Skagit Bay to kick in their share. Seconded by Deanna, motion carried.

Commander's Report by Kari Randall-Secrest: A flyer was passed around, advertising the D16 Spring Photo Contest, in which \$3,600 worth of prizes were up for grabs. She also made order forms available, for those who were still wanting to get their rendezvous shirts during the first order, which she will be putting in soon.
