# Using NEXUS to Cross the US Canada Border by boat both ways, our Experience

We took a trip to Sidney BC last summer and used our NEXUS Cards for the first time by boat. We based it on instructions from the web published by both governments. We had done it many times by car. It was a breeze and a joy by boat and this is what we did.

#### **Heading into Canada**

Our ultimate destination was Sidney but you could use that, or any other port of entry, as a waypoint. This was what we did and it worked well.

First, for this to work, <u>everyone</u> on board must have a NEXUS Pass. If not then the boat MUST stop at a port of entry and not use this process.

As we headed west around the end of San Juan Island, we set a waypoint where the International Border was. You need a minimum of 30 minutes to maximum of 4 hours to a designated port of entry. We waited a bit too long and were less than 30 minutes out when we called but it worked ok. When you are in Canada but between 30 mins and 4 hrs estimated out, the skipper must call Nexus at **1-866-99-NEXUS**.

They asked for our ETA and location of landing site. It must be on the "designated site" list which "Port of Sidney BC" was. (A hint here, if it's on your way, you may want to pick a check in site that isn't regularly manned as you won't actually have to touch shore or dock if nobody is there.) We would suggest, and this is only opinion, you don't pick Bedwell Harbor as that is the training site for Canada Customs and is always manned possibly with rookies.

They asked us for name and/or registration of boat. Since we are documented we only gave name. They also asked for the full names, DOB and citizenship of all NEXUS members on board as well as final destination and length of stay.

They finally asked for our NEXUS numbers.

They did not ask for permanent residence status or if we had any goods but they may.

They then gave us an entry number and said welcome to Canada. You need to keep the number for return to US. That was it.

The skipper is still responsible for the behavior, legality and administrative issues of all the passengers and if anything changes before actual arrival, needs to call in again.

The rules state that if an officer is not at the specified entry site at your ETA or at your actual arrival, you may proceed to final destination. Sidney is a phone in Port of Entry with a phone box on dock and is rarely manned unless they have come down to inspect someone for some reason. We only had to drive by the dock on way to our slip and saw that there were no officials there. The harbormaster told us that actually, once we had our number, we didn't even need to bother to do that. That may have been only Sidney but in any case, there was nobody official visible.

#### **Returning to US Waters**

A couple of suggestions to make life easier with this. Before you even leave on the trip you should consider doing 2 things.

- 1) If you are 30' or longer get a CPB user fee decal. This is yearly. You can purchase it when you call in your arrival but this makes it much easier and you won't have to have your credit card ready.
- 2) Call CPB and get a VR number. You may have to use ROAM to do this now but it's handy. That basically puts all your boat info etc. in the system and they may not even ask you some of the questions. One of the first questions we were asked is if we had that number.

Ok. This was just as easy as going into Canada. It was somewhat different but similar.

We came back from Canada the same way we went in by going around north end of San Juan Island. There is no time limit on this and you just need to call in after entering US water but before you reach a port or anchorage. (This is only for Alternate Inspection Programs like NEXUS).

I called CPB at **1-800-562-5943** someplace in Spieden Channel. This number is for Puget Sound arrivals only.

This is what was asked of us in order:

- 1) Our full names, date of birth and citizenship
- 2) Boat name and registration as well as manufacturer.
- 3) Did we have a VR number? (If we had they may have reduced some of the questions)
- 4) CPB decal number. (If we did not have one we could pay for it right now during the call and the sticker would be mailed)
- 5) Current location (This is your GPS coordinates) and destination. Your destination does not have to be a valid port of entry, just where you plan on ending up that day.
- 6) Finally they asked for a return contact number and gave us our clearance number.

They asked no questions about declaring anything or if we were bringing in food or anything. I imagine that they could but chose not to. The guy I spoke to was very friendly and helpful about how to get VR info etc. He walked me through giving current location as I had originally thought it was something like "North End Of San Juan Island". It may have been I was a first timer but he was very cheerful.

That was it, we were cleared. We did not have to do anything else. They could have asked us to stop at the nearest port of entry but have heard this is rare doing it this way.

Again, everyone on board has to have a NEXUS card.

Note: There is a new smartphone app, CPB ROAM, to try for methods other than NEXUS for Washington and Alaska but the above method will still work.

And, this course provides a sound basis for continuing your recreational boating education.
