Looking for some summer reading?

- 1. Arctic Ambitions, Captain Cook and the Northwest Passage, an Anchorage Museum catalog edited by James K. Barnett and David L. Nicandri.
- Illustrated with photos, artwork, maps, manuscript pages.
- 2. Off The Deep End, A History of Madness at Sea by Nic Compton. Many sailors have lost their sanity at sea. Compton considers the physical character of the ocean which can confuse our senses. He discusses the possible madness of explorers like Christopher Columbus and Robert Vancouver.
- 3. <u>Ships and Shipwrecks of the Americas</u> by George F. Bass, traces 1,000 years of nautical misadventures, some of the efforts to locate and restore shipwrecks. It includes art, maps and contemporary photos of the shipwrecks and artifacts.
- 4. <u>Dunkirk, The History Behind The Major Motion Picture</u>, by Joshua Levine who served as a historical consultant for the 2017 Oscar winning epic. He provides a sweeping historical narrative, told in the words of the soldiers, sailors, airmen and civilians involved in those famous nine days.
- 5. <u>Lighthouses of Europe</u> by Thomas Ebelt. Do a comfortable armchair tour of over 70 of the sentinels in 17 countries along the Atlantic, Mediterranean, Baltic and North Seas with spectacular photographs by Thomas Ebelt. Some of the structures are older than the United States.
- 6. <u>The Boat Who Wouldn't Float</u> by Farley Mowat. Follow the uproarious true tale of this Canadian who acquired a rickety ship and sailed along the Newfoundland coast. A highly entertaining memoir from the 1960's.
- 7. <u>In The Company of Dolphins</u> by Irwin Shaw. From St. Tropez to Naples, and across the Adriatic to Dubrovnik and up to Venice, it was the trip of a lifetime. This 1964 travel memoir is a portrait of a bygone age, when the sun-soaked Mediterranean was still emerging from the shadow of World War II and "vacation" truly meant detaching oneself from the world.
- 8. And then, if you didn't get that boat you wanted, console yourself with Harold S. Kushner's Overcoming Life's Disappointments.

What Boaters Can Do For Healthy Oceans

During our Water Sports Fest, some of us were discussing pollution and getting our oceans and other waterways healthier. You know our sea life is suffering greatly. Animals and birds guts are full of plastic and it is killing them. Have you seen the documentary film "A Plastic Ocean"? It's available free on YouTube.

There <u>are</u> things you, one individual, can do to make a difference.

News: Reducing and Reusing are far more important than Recycling (keep recycling and keep reading please)

The best and easiest thing you can do is to not create garbage in the first place. Examples: bring your own coffee container when you go to coffee shops. Those coffee cups are landfill garbage, not compostable, not recyclable. Over 60 billion paper cups are thrown away annually in the U.S. In restaurants, refuse plastic straws; ask for compostable ones or none at all.

Avoid Styrofoam at all costs. Bring your own containers to restaurants to bring home leftovers. There's no shame in that. If restaurants offer you styrofoam, educate them.

Believe it or not Carbon Lite, a US firm that has an innovative method for recycling plastic beverage bottles, is limited by lack of materials! Too many people still throw plastic bottles in the garbage and not the recycle bin. Costco sells Adirondack chairs made from recycled milk bottles.

It is best to use your own washable/reusable beverage container. Don't buy those huge packs of one-use bottled water. Especially if they're shipped in from a far away place.

There is a human health crisis created by the plastics industries who have blatant disregard for the people who live near their underregulated, polluting facilities. Think of cancer alley in Louisiana. Unfortunately there are far too many examples in our world.

Did you know bald eagles are scavenging garbage bags from a landfill near Seattle and dumping the remains in people's back yards?

Do sort your throw-aways by garbage or recyclable. Check with your local trash company for what's recyclable through their trash pick-up. At our house, we only have trash pick up once every two weeks and only 1/2 fill our trash container. The reycle bins are full.
